Letter from the Director



Dear Patrons:

Fall seemingly is passing through quietly due to the absence of many trees, and winter is quickly approaching. Fortunately staff and volunteers now have an office trailer to help endure the bitter cold. We have already had our first snow and the animals are itching with extra energy. Loki seems to be able to vertically bounce ten feet instead of his normal five!

Forecasters are predicting this winter to be one of higher precipitation and colder temperatures than the last. We were particularly concerned for Mucqua negotiating snow and ice this winter. He reined in his 20th year this September. We have since let him enter his retirement years where he has a heated abode, is surrounded by canine friends, pampered by adoring humans and served whatever epicurean delights he desires (pg. 9). After all, he's earned the status of royalty. Anyone know where we can buy some canine bonbons?

The animals are adjusting magnificently since their return. Rajan and Kiki are still waiting for their enclosure to be repaired, crossing our fingers it is done before the onslaught of snow. Renata has also recovered splendidly. At the time of the evacuation, little did *Wolf* staff know that Renata was harboring consolidated pulmonary disease, advanced pneumonia. She most likely came to us, weakened from her previous plight, already dealing with respiratory illness. With her strong will and rugged character, Renata did not outwardly show her illness nor be defeated. It wasn't until we returned to *Wolf* after the evacuation that we noticed she was not as defiant. We then discovered she had pneumonia. The vet said it was a miracle that she had not succumbed to her illness. After repose, a regiment of antibiotics and TLC, she is as insolent as ever, a testament to her fortitude and strength.

I am honored to share in Renata's recovery and Mucqua's golden years. But more than that I am overjoyed to consider myself part of *Wolf* and want to ensure you of *Wolf*'s future. If you have any questions about who I am, what we are doing or simply wish to introduce yourself or voice ideas, I am eager to hear from you. I want you to know that you are a vital team member of *Wolf* on every level whether your feet ever touch the ground here or not. Your continued support in whatever manner is invaluable to us.

Waltz Auctions Dental Day with Tigers: Winner Tells All



What is seven years old, digs canals, donates its labor, and has exotic clients? Answer: The Peter Emily International Veterinary Dental Foundation. Since October 2008, volunteer veterinarians, working with the foundation, have performed 165 root canal therapies and 99 extractions on captive exotic animals.

Recently, I was able to spend a day observing root canals performed on two tigers at The Wild Animal Sanctuary in Keenesburg CO as a result of my having won a live auction at the Waltz for the Wolves fundraiser.

The day began with TWAS staff carrying a male tiger into the operating room in a canvas sling. The tiger was lowered onto a metal grate on the floor, steel chains lifted the grate off the floor, and the staff pushed the grate sideways until it was over the operating table. The grate was then gently lowered into place.

Standing next to the operating table, I was able to take in the size of this approximately 500 pound animal. I thought immediately of what an incredibly powerful machine a ten foot long tiger is. The animal's legs were muscular and its paws were huge (about 1 ¹/₂ times as large as my hands). When I stood in front of the tiger, I found myself staring into an open mouth that I'm pretty sure my head would have fit inside of. I didn't see how anything could escape from this animal once it was in its grasp.

I had root canal surgery preformed a few years ago and was interested to see how a the procedure is done. First, the vets and vet techs took X-rays to find out the exact condition of the tooth they would be working on. Then the doctors drilled holes into the tiger's tooth and inserted custom-made files to remove the decayed tooth's nerve and pulp. After more X-rays, to make sure everything had been repaired correctly, the tooth was sealed. All the while the procedures were being carried out an anesthesiologist kept close watch on the tiger's vital signs.

When I wasn't observing the surgery up close, I walked around the operating table and admired the incredible animal lying on it. I was allowed to stroke the tiger and feel the powerful muscles beneath the surface of its body. When a second tiger, a female, was brought into the operating room, I noticed the striking difference in the patterns of the two tigers' fur. Every tiger has a distinct color pattern, and this allows the staff at The Wild Animal Sanctuary to tell their approximately 75 tigers apart.

I am very grateful to the Peter Emily International Veterinary Dental Foundation for allowing me this once-in-a-lifetime experience. I hope this opportunity is available next year to another lucky Waltz attendee!

Mucqua, the little blind wolf who turned 20 on the 20th of September, has officially begun the retirement life that such a distinguished senior citizen deserves. Mucq was rescued by *Wolf* in 2006. He came from deplorable circumstances at a Wisconsin breeding facility. The owner of the facility died unexpectedly and the animals were unattended for many days until help finally arrived. Mucq was one of the lucky animals who made the journey to *Wolf*. Mucq's eyesight was severely compromised by the time he arrived at *Wolf* and he eventually went blind.

That didn't stop the little wolf. He was able to navigate his way around his enclosure, find a special corner in the sun, and enjoy his new mountain home.

But age made life as he knows it at the Sanctuary difficult for Mucq. As his arthritis advances, it is becoming increasingly more uncomfortable for him during the winter cold and snow that lasts for many months. So the Sanctuary staff helped Mucq retire to posh new circumstances. He now resides in a spacious enclosure that has not only an outdoor run for the wolf Mucq still is at heart but a heated indoor space for a little extra pampering and protection from the elements should he so desire. Mucq has found his favorite corner and he loves to lounge in heated luxury. But best of all, Mucq is now having a "spa" experience.

Devoted staff and volunteers who adore this fellow, have developed a special routine for Mucq that includes gentle care and feeding. He is pampered with special meals (boiled

chicken is a favorite), massage and grooming sessions, enhanced hygiene and special music that lulls him to sleep. Volunteers and staff have a strong rapport with Mucq and he seems to revel in the attention. He is safe, secure and snug as a bug in his luxury enclosure. The little wolf who endured so much is now living the good life in retirement.

Road Restyling

Wolf

Wolf has spent over a month hauling in recycled asphalt and in some cases road base to fill in areas of washout and potholes along the access road. Touching up the road was a necessity. We were able to update the road that winds near the animals' enclosures and touches the entrance and exit to the fire



road. Yet the road was fixed for another reason, so that Wolf could receive a long awaited office trailer, only deliverable by semi. Thank goodness we got it in here before the snow!



Help from Above

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'Whop-whop', this was the sound of the helicopters that began aerial mulching in early October. Wolf's property was among some of the private land that was moderately to severely burned. Because our property slopes upwards of 60% and we are "strategically located in areas where life, safety, or prop-

erty [are] at risk or where there is high risk to public water supply," Wolf received aerial mulching and seeding aid that were "emergency stabilization treatments, to address impacts of the High Park Fire (RCVFD)."

Enclosure Foreclosure



When the efforts began to repair the two uninhabitable enclosures on Woll's property, the damage was more severe than anticipated. First, the habitats were cleared of all ash and burned logs, and while this was time intensive, the progress had barely begun. Dig guard has Clearing out Ash been laid and the horizontal

fencing is complete but dig guard logs and terracing logs still need to have holes drilled in them and rebar pounded through so they can be anchored to the ground before we can put those in place.

Many more man-hours will be needed place before this project can be deemed finished. Yet we are determined to return Kiki and Rajan to their previous lo-

cation, hopefully before winter, so when spring graces us with her presence we can gear our labor towards fire dens and mending other enclosures that were affected but not destroyed.



More to Come

We will remain forever grateful to the Rist Canyon Volunteer Fire Department, the multitude of work-groups, coming from as far as Glenwood Springs and Wyoming, and as always to our incredible volunteers and charitable donors for their steadfast assistance during and after the High Park Fire. even with this assistance, *Wolf* is far from being whole.

Three enclosures still need to be fully repaired while we hope to undertake updating drainage ways and beginning other projects to aide in flood prevention and erosion damage. In addition, we still have hundreds of burned and dying trees that need to cut and removed from the facility. Once these time sensitive tasks have



been completed we aim to immediately return to finishing our fire den project that began in summer 2011.

We have a lot to do but with your help we are up for the task!
