

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W.O.L.F. Spring 2022 W.O.L.F. Sanctuary Gala A Howling Success!

On Saturday, April 9th, W.O.L.F. hosted their annual gala fundraiser, themed this year "A Furry Tail." The event raises funds for the four-legged animals at the Sanctuary and their future home.

Over 200 attendees joined the event for an evening of fun and philanthropy in an enchanted forest at the Hilton, Fort Collins. Colorado's First Gentleman Reis opened the event with remarks on protecting wolves in the state and his dedication towards wildlife. The evening continued with a statement from Sally Boccella, representative for Senator Hickenlooper, on their support for W.O.L.F. Sanctuary and Mission of Rescue, Sanctuary, and Education. Additionally, Larimer County Commissioner Jody Shaddock-McNally joined the event in support of W.O.L.F.

The night continued with W.O.L.F. Ambassador Outlaw, who made certain to visit supporters wagging his tail and giving out kisses to those graced by his spirited presence. Staff and supporters dressed to the theme wearing fairy tale inspired costumes as Little Red Riding Hood, wizards, fairies, princesses, and wolves—just to name a few!

Attendees had the opportunity to bid on unique silent and live auction items inclusive of local art, jewelry, excursions, and so much more. From ice climbing, an original painting by talented artist Julie Kramer Cole, to a wolf trekking excursion in Yellowstone, there was something for everyone that evening! Additionally, we had eight guardian angels purchased at full price during the event, where supporters could represent a specific wolf dog for the year. This was a groundbreaking record! The excitement during the event continued as a handspun shawl created by local artist Kris Paige with beloved past resident Isabeau's fur was sold for \$100,000 through an estate pledge by a dedicated supporter.

The event closed with a presentation by VIP guest speaker Suzanne Asha Stone, Executive Director of the International Wildlife Coexistence Network. Dressed to the theme in a "grandma" inspired costume, she shared an adaptation of Little Red



Riding Hood, where the wolf is perceived as a friend, not a villain, and educated attendees on the plight of wolves in the Northern Rockies Region. Stone worked for Defenders of Wildlife as their Idaho based wolf conservationist covering wolf conservation across much of the West from the Rockies to the Pacific Northwest and California. In 2008, she founded the Wood River Wolf Project in Idaho to demonstrate that wolves can coexist with sheep operations on national forests when adequate nonlethal deterrents are consistently applied. Attendees had an opportunity to participate in a Q&A session with Suzanne and learned more about the importance of coexistence tools. They also learned how they could be a voice to help support an emergency relisting necessary to protect Northern Rocky wolves.

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

Training to Enrich the Animals' Lives

I have been training pets, dogs, and their people professionally for the last 10 years. As a new trainer I came to realize that most humans mean well but were failing to understand their dogs and meet their needs in a species appropriate way. As a society I think we all must unlearn some of the

unrealistic expectations we put on dogs to always behave just because we say so. The dog training industry has long been unregulated and filled with "trainers" who are happy to compromise animal welfare, so dogs are "obedient" no matter the cost. As a professional trainer I guide my clients to understand their dogs as individuals -- to understand how breed, environment and learning history all play a significant role in their dogs' behavior. I teach my clients to meet their dog where they are at, to understand what motivates them, what makes them feel uncomfortable and how their dog shows those emotions through their body language. As a professional trainer, I am committed to teaching all humans and their dogs following

LIMA training principles. Least Intrusive, Minimally Aversive training techniques are proven to be the most humane for the animal and in turn yield the longest lasting and reliable response from dogs.


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Over the last 10 years I have found my calling in the pet dog world taking on aggression and reactivity cases. There are a lot of reasons why dogs will escalate to reactive and aggressive behavior but the overarching reason is lack of perceived safety for the dog. Once we can understand what is triggering the dog to escalate there is so much we put into place to keep humans and dogs safe and allow the dogs to live a long healthy life.

How does working with pet dogs translate to training wolf hybrids?

The learning principles are the same for dogs and wolf hybrids alike. Surprisingly training wolf hybrids is not much different than training pet dogs, with the exception of some of the in-



tense fear responses to new people in the animals at the Sanctuary. When I was asked to come in and work with a young male hybrid who was displaying some overly excited behavior towards humans I knew I could put training in place decrease the to overall behavior and train much more de-

sirable behaviors. Topaz was really behaving like a 1-year-old wolf hybrid should -- overly excited, jumping, mouthing and having a hard time doing anything else. It's important to realize that neither dogs nor wolf hybrids have malicious intentions when behaving in an overly excited manner. Topaz was really just displaying behaviors that came and felt natural to him. There was no sense in punishing behaviors that came natural to him. The goal was to teach him other behaviors that could get him the attention he so desperately wanted in a safer manner for staff.

We started by teaching Topaz a foundation behavior called targeting. We use a stick with a ball on the end and the objective was for Topaz to touch the target with his nose and earn reinforce-



ment along the way. In addition to targeting, we taught him that a clicking noise from our handheld clickers meant that a tasty food reinforcement was on its way. Clicker training has long been an effective way to teach animals of all kinds the skills we need from them. Topaz learned targeting the first day I met him. All animals are capable of learning as long as we humans put the right reinforcements in place to motivate the animals to participate. In addition to targeting, we also taught Topaz a stationing behavior. He has a wooden spool in his habitat that was perfect for the training. We taught Topaz to jump up on the spool when staff were in the habitat so he could get the attention he

wanted but also prevent him from jumping and mouthing at staff. Topaz is a very motilearner, vated and his stationing behavior is working so nicely today. He is able to jump up on his spool, get some pets and then participate in more training.



Wolf hybrid relationships, the good and bad.

While the majority of the animals at the sanctuary are very happy to be paired and share their lives with one companion, it's not always as easy as that. Social (continued on page 9)



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(continued from page 6) dynamics are very similar in pet dogs as they are in wolf hybrids and in both cases tensions can arise. Another aspect of the work I do is helping the animals coexist as best as they can and prevent conflicts from arising. Just like the work I do with pet dogs, I meet the animals where they are at. Yuki and Kieran while they enjoyed each other's company sometimes,



were also having a hard time getting along. It is very normal in the dog world to mature from young animal 6 months - 18 months and then have different preferences as an adult at 2ish years old. Something we did was give both Yuki and Kieran a nice break from each other. Sometimes space and some time can go a long way for tensions between animals. After a break from each other we were able to allow play dates with Yuki and Kieran with great success. I really appreciate how the sanctuary staff were open and understanding of my suggestion to let Yuki and Kieran live mostly separate lives with play dates to satisfy their play needs. All animals are different and the Sanctuary does such a nice job of allowing all of their animals to live how they most prefer.





Preparations for the move.

After several weeks of getting to know a majority of the animals and teaching foundational skills like targeting and stationing I was ready to put more training plans into place to prepare all of the residents for the move to Red Feather. The nice thing about time is that it allows me to put a training plan into place for every animal and then pivot the plan depending on the animal's needs. Crate training is in motion for every single animal at the sanctuary. By slowly teaching the animals to be comfortable in their crates we are able to prevent at least one stressor from the move. We can




only hope that there won't have to be any emergency evacuations in the future but the more comfortable the animals are going into their crates, the easier moving them to safety becomes. Many of the animals that got foundational training are already going into their crates on cue and getting more comfortable hanging out inside with the door closed. Yuki, Kieran, Outlaw, Topaz, Tenali, Spartacus and Ashima are well on their way in crate training. Some of the more fearful animals are also making progress but in a way that they feel comfortable. Crate training is a simple skill that is going to greatly benefit all of the animals at the Sanctuary.

Long term goals.

While the focus right now is preparations for the move, we also have many ambitious long term training goals. A common practice in many zoo's and other wolf sanctuaries is teaching the animals to more actively participate in their care. Consent in care is a special passion of mine and I have seen it work with my own pet dog. By teaching my dog the framework for opting in and opting out, he has voluntarily stood still for vaccinations, blood draws, nail trims and other exams. The crate training is the priority for now but once the animals are comfortable at Red Feather we will be teaching them all the framework for participating in the care they need. This not only decreases stress for the animals, but this also allows us to provide the best care we possibly can, so that each animal can live out their days as the happiest, healthiest version of themselves.

As an added bonus to all of the training we have been doing, the animals are not only learning valuable skills, but it is also a great outlet for their minds. The animals are already receiving excellent care and enrichment. The training just ac-

cents their already existing care and leads to a more satisfied mind and as you can imagine a lot of well-deserved naps after training sessions. I am so looking forward to seeing the animals progress and enjoy the process of training well into the future.



Red Feather Update

Since we last updated our newsletter readers about the Red Feather Lakes project in the summer of 2021, significant progress has been made on the project. W.O.L.F. is now very close to completing the components of the project needed to relocate the wolves to their new home. While there is still a lot that needs to be done, we are really excited about the progress that has been made and appreciative of the excellent team that has been assembled to work up at Red Feather Lakes.

Several key project components have been completed, including:

- Completion of the habitat enclosures and perimeter vertical fencing, including the final inspection and closure of the Building Permit with Larimer County;
- Completion of the main road, including testing the road, submittal of the as built drawings to Larimer County, final inspection and closures of the Development Construction Permit, Right of Way Access Permit and the associated Stormwater Permit with the State of Colorado;
- Installation of the water well;
- The design for the Onsite Wastewater Treatment System (OWTS), better known as the septic system, is complete;

There are several other project components that are currently in progress, including:

- Joe Walton, Walton Construction LLC will begin installing dig guard in all of the habitat enclosures on April 21st, 2022. The expected completion is in August of this year.
- SA Miro has completed the engineering design for the meat processing building. W.O.L.F. staff have requested bids and these are under review.

Thank you to all of our supporters, contractors and everyone else that are helping us make this new site a reality!

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New Board Member Interview Audrey Nelson PhD



What inspired you to become involved with W.O.L.F. Sanctuary?

About ten years ago, I read Thomas McNamee's The Killing of Wolf Number 10. It was a disturbing account of the killing of a wolf. I promised myself that I would get involved with a sanctuary for wolves when I was in retirement and had more time.

As a species, wolves play a unique role in the ecosystem of the western United States. When I learned about the mindless approach to wolves in the environment practiced by ranching and farming communities, I was motivated to learn more and try and do something about the problem.

Can you share your background with us and how you became an animal advocate?

I have spent my career advising corporate clients about gender re-

I look forward to the opportunity to help the Sanctuary expand its influence in Colorado and realize its potential in the new facility at Red Feather Lakes. Red Feather: What's Left To Do?





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
