

The History of W.O.L.F. Sanctuary

Celebrating 30 Years of Rescue, Sanctuary, and Education

In 1994, Pat Lanteri and Frank Wendland welcomed a wolf-dog puppy named Shaka into their home after her previous owners found her wolf-like behaviors too challenging to manage. This experience opened their eyes to the plight of captive-born wolves and wolf dogs—animals often misunderstood, mistreated, and frequently euthanized due to their complex needs. Determined to make a difference, they set out to rescue as many as possible and give them a safe, permanent home.

Pat and Frank purchased four adjacent parcels of land in Rist Canyon, Colorado, totaling approximately 180 acres. The location was remote and rugged, accessible only by a dirt road that stretched over two miles and crossed six private properties. In 1994, they built the first enclosures, and on July 5, 1995, W.O.L.F. Sanctuary was officially incorporated as a 501(c)(3) nonprofit organization. Its mission was clear from the start: to rescue and provide lifelong sanctuary for captive-born wolves and wolf dogs, educate the public about their unique challenges, and promote conservation efforts for wild wolves. By the end of its founding year, W.O.L.F. had already saved 20 animals.

W.O.L.F. operated in Rist Canyon for nearly two decades, but the sanctuary faced significant challenges from the remote landscape and natural disasters. One of the most pivotal moments came on June 9, 2012, when the High Park Fire broke out. As the flames spread, Shelley J. Coldiron, PhD—who had recently joined W.O.L.F.'s board while leading a biotech startup—reached out to the Executive Director to check on the Sanctuary. She was assured that an evacuation plan was in place, but there was no designated emergency housing for the animals.

As evacuation became necessary, the first group of animals was transported to Coldiron's three-acre property outside Loveland. The rest were rescued with the help of Pat Craig's team and temporarily housed at The Wild Animal Sanctuary. With the Rist Canyon property uninhabitable for more than three weeks, Coldiron's home became W.O.L.F.'s temporary headquarters. During this time, the former Executive Director resigned, and Coldiron stepped in to lead the organization through its most difficult period. One year later, on the anniversary of returning to Rist Canyon, a devastating flash flood emphasized the urgent need for a safer, more sustainable

home. Coldiron left her professional career to dedicate herself fully to W.O.L.F., leading the charge to find a new location for the animals.

A New Beginning in Red Feather Lakes

After years of searching, W.O.L.F. found its forever home: a 180-acre property near Red Feather Lakes equipped with electrical service, essential structures, and a reliable water source. But before moving, the Sanctuary had to navigate a complex permitting process with Larimer County, raise funds for the property purchase, and construct infrastructure suited to the unique needs of wolf dogs.

W.O.L.F. was preparing to hire contractors when Laura Davis joined the team as Senior Director of Operations. With expertise in compliance, environmental regulations, public health, and project management, Davis quickly became instrumental in overseeing the project. When COVID-19 hit, supply chain disruptions and skyrocketing material costs posed additional challenges, but Davis persisted—securing qualified contractors and ensuring all work met regulatory standards.

Funds raised were invested in:

- Building spacious, naturalistic half-acre habitats with deck pens and feeding/water stations
- Relocating the entrance road for safer access
- Developing a water well and modern septic system
- Installing a site-wide security system with surveillance cameras
- Upgrading electrical service to the headquarters building

Finally, in August and September 2023, W.O.L.F. successfully relocated its animals to the new Sanctuary. Today, the residents enjoy ample space to roam, boulders to climb, and lifelong care in a setting designed for their safety, enrichment, and well-being.

Looking Ahead: Building the Future of W.O.L.F.




Our future plans include:

- Expanding our facility by converting the headquarters building into dedicated office space for staff and volunteers, along with a small veterinary clinic for routine exams and procedures
- Constructing a meat processing facility equipped with a walk-in freezer, industrial dishwasher, and stainless-steel prep stations to safely store and process donated meats
- Creating a visitor pavilion to welcome supporters and guests, complete with restroom facilities and space for future programming

Sanctuary Updates

From Laura Davis, Senior Director of Operations



Spring is finally around the corner, and everyone (people and wolf dogs alike) are looking forward to the change in seasons! It has been a long winter, and even though it is not completely over, signs of spring are everywhere. There are wildflowers emerging in the habitats along with grass, making everything look green.

This winter, we utilized some of the equipment that our generous supporters made possible. The generators used to heat the water buckets helped keep water available to the animals in colder environments. While we still have some enhancements to make, this was a huge leap forward in caring for our residents during the winter months.

This spring, we are turning our attention to constructing new shelters made from cinder blocks for each of our habitats. WOLF has received great support from the Larimer County Department of Natural Resources (LCDNR) and their significant others. They spent several weekends in the late fall/early winter constructing the shelter prototype in Kyah and Kieran's habitat. This pair was chosen due to their unique ability to deconstruct just about anything. The shelter has done quite well, and both Kyah and Kieran enjoy spending time there.

Otterbox has chosen WOLF for the fourth year in a row for their Closed2Open campaign. Employees donate the hours for one day to a nonprofit organization of their choice. We are so fortunate to have the Otters select WOLF once again for this event. In partnership with LCDNR, construction on additional shelters will begin during the Closed2Open event.

Through the partnership with the Northern Colorado Sawyers, WOLF will work with team members to perform additional fire mitigation, including installing a fire break on WOLF's property and repairing the internal roads used to access the habitats. Scott James continues to assist WOLF with identifying resources and new team members. He is still actively engaged in removing hazard trees from the Sanctuary.



It is also the time of year when we work very closely with our Veterinarian, Dr. Teva Stone, in performing annual exams. These are conducted throughout the summer and early fall and include a physical examination and vaccination of the animals, as needed. The first exams were conducted on April 27th and included 7 of our residents.

We had a wonderful time celebrating Earth Day with the students and staff at Werner Elementary! About 186 students and teachers stopped by to learn more about wolves, their vital role in healthy ecosystems, and the work we do at W.O.L.F. Sanctuary to care for rescued wolf dogs.

Gala Recap






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
